

Tennis Workshops (July 21-25)

Greetings (from David Treichel),

This summer, two or three tennis teaching professionals will visit me for one week in July (21-25). These are good friends who will be making their first trip to the Bay. We are excited to offer club members and guests one week of tennis workshops (and, maybe, some private lessons) during this week. The club has graciously offered us the use of up to three courts during the afternoons. Our plan is teach both junior and adult workshops from 1:00 to 5:00 pm daily. The junior (under age 16) workshops will probably run each day from 1-2 pm and 2-3 pm. The adult workshops will run from 3-4 pm and 4-5 pm. We are asking for donations of \$20 per person per hour of instruction. Your donations will help with travel expenses for my friends. Participants may sign up for as few or many hours as they would like. Smaller hourly donations are requested for participants who sign up for multiple days or for multiple persons from the same family.

I am currently in Lincoln, Nebraska –an inconvenient place from which to organize the workshops. I will arrive at the Bay within the first few days of July. Blake is currently a professor of engineering at Milwaukee School of Engineering. He also serves as the head tennis coach for men's tennis.
